WHERE IS THE BLACKADDER- WOODBIDGE CATCHMENT?

The Blackadder Woodbridge Catchment (BWC) is an urban catchment around the suburbs of Midland, Midvale, Viveash, Greenmount, Swanview and Stratton, covering an area of 2070 hectares.

Its boundaries are generally within the Great Eastern Hwy to the south, Toodyay Rd to the north, Swanview Rd to the east and the Swan River to the west.



It is a priority catchment through the Swan River Trust, which means that the creeks are major contributors of nutrients (mostly phosphorus and nitrogen) to the Swan River System.

The BWC is a critical biodiversity corridor with

a little over 6% of remnant vegetation remaining (only 3% of which is in good condition) in the catchment. A special feature of the BWC is the Talbot Rd Bushland Reserve which is also the head of Blackadder Creek.

WHAT DOES OUR CATCHMENT GROUP DO?

Formed in 1997, the group grew out of community concern for the degraded state of the Blackadder and Woodbridge Creeks and



the effect of land use impacts within the catchment. There are a number of serious environmental management issues of concern to the group, including: biodiversity and habitat decline, erosion, poor community awareness, urban land use and development, significance of Aboriginal cultural heritage and water quality decline.
